# Health Sciences 4721 A/B – Aging and Marginalized Populations

This course examines aging from the perspective of vulnerable, under represented and at-risk populations. Students will develop an understanding of the unique health experiences and challenges faced by older individuals who are relegated to, or find themselves on, the margins of society.

Prerequisite(s): Health Science 2711A/B

Pre- or Corequisite(s): Health Sciences 4730F/G

0.5 course, 3 hours per week.

Effective **September 1, 2013**, Health Sciences 4480A/B (Health System Change Management) will be introduced in the School of Health Studies.

# Health Sciences 4480A/B - Health System Change Management

This course employs classic change management theories, positive psychology, complexity science and social movement theories to analyze current health system issues and to develop actionable change processes. Individual, organizational and societal elements required for lasting change are emphasized through use of the case method of learning, experiential exercises and lectures.

Antirequisite(s): Health Sciences 4091B section 001 if taken in 2012-13

Pre- or Corequisite(s): Health Sciences 3400A/B or 3042A/B

3 lecture hours, 0.5 course

Effective **September 1, 2013**, Health Sciences 4490A/B (Health Innovation and Leadership) will be introduced in the School of Health Studies.

# Health Sciences 4490A/B - Health Innovation and Leadership

This course is designed to provide students with a broad understanding of leadership and innovation strategies

in the health care system in Canada. The course will also provide students with "hands on" experience/exposure to health care system issues through guest speakers, debates and in-class assignments.

Antirequisite(s): Health Sciences 4090A section 002 if taken in 2012-13

Pre- or Corequisite(s): Health Sciences 3400A/B or 3042A/B

3 lecture hours, 0.5 course

Effective **September 1, 2013**, Rehabilitation Sciences 3125A/B (Enabling Health & Well-Being Through Occupation) will be introduced in the School of Health Studies.

# Rehabilitation Sciences 3125A/B - Enabling Health & Well-Being Through Occupation

This course addresses the construct of 'occupation' as explored and understood within the field of occupational science and practice of occupational therapy. Students will develop and apply an occupational perspective to address contemporary issues and to consider the relationship between occupation and health and well-being.

Antirequisite(s): Health Sciences 3091A section 001 if taken in 2011-12 or 2012-13

Prerequisite(s): Registration in a Rehabilitation Sciences module or enrollment in the School of Health Studies. 3 lecture hours, 0.5 course

Effective **September 1, 2013**, Rehabilitation Sciences 4605A/B (Rehabilitation Psychology) will be introduced in the School of Health Studies.

# Rehabilitation Sciences 4605A/B – Rehabilitation Psychology

This course will cover a range of applications of psychology in rehabilitation. Topics such as pain management, cognitive retraining and psychological adjustment to disability will be explored using examples of rehabilitation of traumatic brain injury, spinal cord injury and sport injury.

Antirequisite(s): Health Sciences 4091A section 001 if taken in 2011-12 or 2012-13

Prerequisite(s): Registration in a Rehabilitation Sciences module or enrollment in the School of Health Studies. 3 lecture hours, 0.5 course

Effective **September 1, 2013**, the modular requirements be revised for the Honors Specialization in Health Sciences with Biology module in the School of Health Studies.

# HONORS SPECIALIZATION IN HEALTH SCIENCES WITH BIOLOGY Admission Requirements
