FACULTY OF ARTS AND HUMANITIES

ENGLISH AND WRITING STUDIES

Effective **September 1, 2013**, the Minor in General English on main campus be revised.

MINOR IN GENERAL ENGLISH

Admission Requirements:

Completion of first-year requirements, including 1.0 course from English 1020E or 1022E or 1024E or 1035E or 1036E or both of English 1027F/G and 1028F/G with a mark of at least 60%. Students should consult with the Department prior to admission.

1.0 course from: English at the 2200 level or above.

FRENCH STUDIES

Effective **September 1, 2013**, the Department of French Studies will offer 4 new 3000-level special topics courses:
French 3610F/G-3613F/G - Aesthetic Forms and Practices.

French 3610F/G-3613F/G - Aesthetic Forms and Practices: Special Topics

These specialized courses will deal with literary and cultural topics, themes and issues, which may cross historical, generic and cultural borders. For particular courses offered each year, please consult the French Studies website.

Prerequisite(s): Both French 2905A/B and 2906A/B and both French 2605F/G and 2606F/G.

3 lecture hours, 0.5 course.

Effective **September 1, 2013**, the Department of French Studies will offer a new 4000-level course: *French 4600E - Research Methods and Independent Paper.*

French 4600E -- Research Methods and Independent Paper

In this capstone course, students will solidify the skills and knowledge acquired during their studies in French. Bi-monthly group meetings will focus on research methods and professional writing and each student, under the supervision of a faculty member, will develop a research project oriented towards his or her professional interests.

Prerequisite(s): 4th-year Honours Specialization in the Department of French Studies and at least 1.0 course in French literature or French linguistics at the 3000 level (3500-3899), or permission of the Department.

1.0 course (0.5 in-class component + 0.5 independent research paper).

Effective **September 1, 2013**, the Minor in Francophone Studies be modified so as to better correspond to students' expectations and interests.

*With the permission of the Department or program involved, up to one full course may be counted towards both the Minor in Francophone Studies and another Major, Specialization or Honors Specialization. Courses not listed but which cover a Francophone world topic may also be counted, with the permission of the Department or program involved and the Faculty of Arts and Humanities. Students are responsible for checking and fulfilling the specific prerequisites for all courses in which they register.

Effective **September 1, 2013**, the Minor in French Studies be modified to include a French and Francophone Civilization component.

MINOR IN FRENCH STUDIES

Admission Requirements

Completion of first-year requirements, including French 1900E or 1910 with a mark of at least 60%, or permission of the Department.

Note: Courses taken for the Certificate in Business French can count towards the Minor module, but the Minor cannot be combined with other French modules.

WOMEN'S STUDIES AND FEMINIST RESEARCH

Effective **March 1, 2013**, Women's Studies 2203F/G: *Future Sex: Sex and Science Fiction* be introduced in the Faculty of Arts and Humanities and the Faculty of Social Science.

Women's Studies 2203F/G: Future Sex: Sex and Science Fiction

Beginning with cutting edge contemporary practices, from sex reassignment surgery to virtual reality, this course will look at the ways in which we imagine the future of gender and sexuality. The focus will be primarily on science fiction texts that provide interesting alternatives to present-day ideas about sex and sexuality.

3 hours, 0.5 course

Effective **March 1, 2013**, Women's Studies 2223F/G: *Gender, Sexuality and Disability* be introduced in the Faculty of Arts and Humanities and the Faculty of Social Science.

Women's Studies 2223F/G: Gender, Sexuality and Disability

This interdisciplinary course brings a critical lens to the study of disability, sexuality and gender. Employing critical disability studies and feminist, critical sexuality and queer theories, students will explore and question

issues affecting the sexual lives, gender expressions, and subjectivities of people with disabilities.
3 hours, 0.5 course

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FACULTY OF ENGINEERING

Effective **September 1, 2013**, *introduce a new course - MME 2200Q/R/S/T Engineering Shop Safety Training.*

Mechanical and Materials Engineering 2200Q/R/S/T –Engineering Shop Safety Training

This course will provide mechanical engineering undergraduate students with uniform training in the safe use of Engineering student shops.

Prerequisite(s): Entry into Year 2 of the Mechanical Engineering program

Non-credit course

Effective **September 1, 2013**, *revise MME 3360A/B course title to Finite Element Methods in Mechanical Engineering.*

Mechanical and Materials Engineering 3360A/B - Finite Element Methods in Mechanical Engineering

No further changes.

Effective **September 1, 2013**, *add a laboratory component to ECE 4456A/B.*

Electrical and Computer Engineering 4456A/B – Power System Protection

To allow students to: a) gain an understanding of the basic principles of protective relays and b) have a practical understanding of protection schemes for electrical power systems and equipment.

Prerequisites: ECE 4464A/B

3 lecture hours, 1 laboratory hour, 0.5 course

Effective **September 1, 2013**, *the prerequisites for CEE 3384A/B be revised.*

CEE 3384A/B Finite Element Methods in Solid Mechanics

Linear finite element analysis including equilibrium through the principle of minimum potential energy, assembly of stiffness matrices and the imposition of boundary conditions, isoparametric formulation, natural coordinates and numerical integration, numerical solution of equilibrium equations, applications of the Raleigh-Ritz method.

Antirequisite(s): MME 3360A/B.

Prerequisite(s): **CEE 2221A/B** ~~ES-1036A/B, CEE 2202A/B, CEE 2219A/B or the former CEE 2218A/B.~~
2 lecture hours, 2 laboratory hours, 0.5 course.

Effective **September 1, 2013**, CEE 3341A/B be revised.

Civil and Environmental Engineering 3341A/B - Structural Theory IV

This course emphasizes practical aspects of structural analysis. Topics covered in the course include **approximate analysis methods for frames, shear walls, and coupled frame-shear wall buildings under lateral loads, computer simulation and modelling of buildings and bridges, and buckling analysis of columns and frames.**

Prerequisite(s): CEE 3340A/B, ~~Applied Mathematics 2411 or 2415.~~
3 lecture hours, 2 tutorial/laboratory hours, 0.5 course.

BRESCIA UNIVERSITY COLLEGE, HURON UNIVERSITY COLLEGE, and KING'S UNIVERSITY COLLEGE

Effective **September 1, 2013**, Calculus 1100A/B: Calculus I with Fundamentals be withdrawn from Brescia University College, Huron University College and King's University College.

BRESCIA UNIVERSITY COLLEGE and KING'S UNIVERSITY COLLEGE

Effective **September 1, 2013**, antirequisites for History 1403E be revised at King's University College and Brescia University College to include History 2147A/B.

History 1403E - Totalitarianism

A survey of the totalitarian phenomenon in history with emphasis on twentieth-century totalitarian systems. The course will examine the similarities and differences of Nazis, Communists, and Italian Fascists, both in theory and in practice and with respect to foreign policy as well as domestic affairs.

Antirequisite(s): History 2145A/B, **2147A/B**

3 hours, 1.0 course.

BRESCIA UNIVERSITY COLLEGE**MANAGEMENT AND ORGANIZATIONAL STUDIES**

Effective **September 1, 2013**, MOS 3321F/G: Consumer Behavior, and MOS 3322F/G: Integrated Marketing Communications be offered at Brescia. These courses are already offered on Main Campus.

Management and Organizational Studies 3321F/G – Consumer Behavior

This course focuses on understanding and predicting consumer behavior by integrating theories from psychology, sociology, anthropology and economics. Emphasis will be on how behavior is shaped by internal and external influences.

Prerequisite(s): MOS 2320A/B or MOS 3320A/B, and enrollment in 3rd or 4th year of BMOS.

3 lecture hours, 0.5 course.

Management and Organizational Studies 3322F/G – Integrated Marketing Communications

This course focuses on the theories, concepts, and applications of integrated marketing communications, covering the elements of advertising, sales promotion, public relations, publicity, personal selling, direct marketing, and interactive marketing. The goal is to understand how marketing communications reaches and serves customers, and how it helps to shape consumer behavior.

Prerequisite(s): MOS 2320A/B or MOS 3320A/B, and enrollment in 3rd or 4th year of BMOS.

3 lecture hours, 0.5 course.

HURON UNIVERSITY COLLEGE**INTERDISCIPLINARY STUDIES**

Effective **September 1, 2013**, IDIS 2230F/G, Perspectives on Communications, be introduced at Huron University College.

Interdisciplinary Studies 2230F/G - Perspectives on Communication

This course is a study, from a variety of disciplinary perspectives, of sender-receiver relationships as they develop through the 19th and 20th centuries from the telegraph, phonograph, and photograph through cinema, radio, television, and the internet.

Antirequisite(s): MIT 2000F/G

Pre-requisite(s): Completion of first-year requirements.
