Chemistry 1024A/B - Chemistry for Engineers

Course description: No change.

Antirequisite(s): Chemistry 1302A/B, the former Chemistry 1100A/B, 1200B, 1050 Chemistry 1100A/B and

Chemistry 1200B or the former Chemistry 1050.

Prerequisite(s): Grade 12 U (SCH4U) Chemistry.

3 lecture hours, 3 laboratory/tutorial hours, 0.5 course.

KING'S UNIVERSITY COLLEGE

ENGLISH

Effective **September 1, 2015**, the following courses will be introduced at King's University College with some minor revisions; they are already offered at other Affiliates.

English 3774E - Canadian Literature

A study of the history of English Canadian literature from its beginnings in the literature of the explorers and settlers to its full maturity in contemporary times. The broad scope of the course enables the student to trace the imaginative growth of the nation.

Antirequisite(s): English 2351E, 2352F/G, 2353F/G, 2354E, 2355F/G, 2356F/G, and the former English 281E. Prerequisite(s): At least 60% in 1.0 of English 1020E or 1022E or 1024E or 1035E or 1036E or both English 1027F/G and 1028F/G, 1901E or permission of the Department.

3 hours, 1.0 course

(Huron, King's)

English 4070E - Directed Readings in Literature

A program of intensive reading in an author, group of authors, period, movement, genre or theme under the direction of a full-time faculty member who is willing to supervise the student. The proposed subject of study will be presented to the faculty member in the term prior to that in which the course will begin.

Prerequisite(s): Only fourth year honours students with an average of at least 80% in their third year English courses are eligible. Permission of the department is also required.

1.0 course. (Huron, King's)

English 4080F/G - Directed Readings in Literature

A program of intensive reading in an author, group of authors, period, movement, genre or theme under the direction of a full-time faculty member who is willing to supervise the student. The proposed subject of study will be presented to the faculty member in the term prior to that in which the course will begin.

Prerequisite(s): Only fourth year honours students with an average of at least 80% in their third year English courses are eligible. Permission of the department is also required.

0.5 course.

PSYCHOLOGY

Effective September 1, 2015, the following course will be introduced.

Psychology 2065A/B - The Psychology of Religion and Spirituality

A survey of the psychological study of religiosity and spirituality. Topics include psychological theories or religiosity, developmental trends, neuropsychology and religious experience, and religiosity and relationships, social behavior, and health.

Antirequisite(s): Psychology 3772F/G

3 lecture hours, 0.5 course.

Effective September 1, 2015, the following course will be revised.

Psychology 3772F/G - Psychology of Religion and Spirituality: Selected Topics

An examination of selected topics in the psychology of religion.

Antirequisite(s): Psychology 2065A/B

Prerequisite(s): Psychology 2840F/G (or Psychology 2800E, 2820E, 2830A/B, 2855F/G or 2856F/G) and registration in the third or fourth year of Honors Specialization, Honors Double Major, Major or Specialization in Psychology, or permission of the Department.

3 lecture hours, 0.5 course.

SOCIAL JUSTICE AND PEACE STUDIES

Effective September 1, 2015, the following courses will be introduced.

Social Justice and Peace Studies 3380F/G: Justice and Alternative Economic Systems

An advanced exploration of the main philosophical debates over what a just and free society should look like. We investigate the strengths and weaknesses of contemporary capitalism, and contrast it with a range of economic alternatives including social democracy, state-socialism, market socialism, universal caregiving, workplace democracy, and basic income.

Prerequisite(s): Interdisciplinary Studies 2240F/G, or 1.0 course at 2200 level. 3.0 hours, 0.5 course

Social Justice and Peace Studies 3381F/G: Democracy and the Economy

The democratic ideal defines our times, but to what extent should democracy exist in the economy? In this course students investigate whether the dominant capitalist institutions – the state, market, workplace, media, etc. – foster or undermine democracy. We pay close attention to problems as well as concrete alternatives for economic democracy.

Prerequisite(s): Interdisciplinary Studies 2240F/G, or 1.0 course at 2200 level.
