Effective **September 1, 2016**, the following modules be revised.

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FACULTY OF HEALTH SCIENCES

SCHOOL OF HEALTH STUDIES

Effective **September 1, 2016**, the following courses be introduced.

Health Sciences 3080F/G – Health Promotion and Caring in Rural Contexts

Theory, practice, research and issues related to nursing in rural and remote settings will be examined. The health status of various rural populations, related public policy and the factors influencing health of rural residents will be explored.

Antirequisite(s): Nursing 3380F/G; Health Sciences 3090A, section 001, if taken in 2014-15 or 2015-16; Health Sciences 3090B, section 001, if taken in 2011-12 or 2012-13.

Prerequisite(s): Registration in the third or fourth year in the School of Health Studies.

3 lecture hours, 0.5 course.

Health Sciences 4074A/B – Guidelines for Physical Activity and Exercise in Older Adults

Guidelines and benefits of physical activity programs for older adults will be the focus. The epidemiology of relationships between physical activity and functional independence, physiological responses to exercise and chronic adaptations with training (both cardiorespiratory

and strength), and the exercise influence on age-related chronic diseases will be examined.

Antirequisite(s): Kinesiology 4474A/B; Health Sciences 4090B, section 002, if taken in 2012-13, 2013-14, 2014-15, 2015-16.

Prerequisite(s): Registration in the third or fourth year in the School of Health Studies.

3 lecture hours, 0.5 course.

SCHOOL OF KINESIOLOGY

*Effective **September 1, 2016**, the following courses be introduced.*

Kinesiology 2984A/B – Hockey Fundamentals and Coaching

The course will follow a natural progression focusing on fundamental ice hockey skill development, coaching philosophy and strategy. It will introduce basic rules and skills and the strategy and theory of coaching ice hockey. The course will also cover many of the elements found in the Hockey Canada Coach Level coaching course.

Antirequisite(s): Kin 2908Q/R/S/T, Kin 3908Q/R/S/T.

Prerequisite(s): Completion of first year of the Kinesiology program and registration in the School of Kinesiology.

5 lecture/laboratory hours, 0.5 course.

Kinesiology 2986A/B – Tennis

The development of skilled performance in selected tennis activities as well as a study of some key principles in teaching these activities and how it can be applied to Kinesiology. The application of biomechanics, learning progressions, error detection/correction methods, history of the sport, psychology, sports management and safety considerations.

Antirequisite(s): Kin 2916Q/R/S/T, Kin 3916Q/R/S/T.

Prerequisite(s): Completion of first year of the Kinesiology program and registration in the School of Kinesiology.

5 lecture/laboratory hours, 0.5 course.

Kinesiology 2987A/B – Track and Field

The development of skilled performance in selected track and field activities as well as a study of some key principles in teaching these activities in physical education. The application of principles of biomechanics, learning progressions, error detection/correction methods, and safety considerations in teaching track & field activities.

Antirequisite(s): Kin 2917Q/R/S/T, Kin 3917Q/R/S/T.

Prerequisite(s): Completion of first year of the Kinesiology program and registration in the School of Kinesiology.

5 lecture/laboratory hours, 0.5 course.

Kinesiology 2988A/B – Volleyball Fundamentals and Coaching

The development of skilled performance and coaching skills in selected volleyball activities as well as a study of some of the key principles in teaching these activities. Application of biomechanics, motor learning, rules, teaching progressions, detection and correction of errors in teaching/coaching volleyball.

Antirequisite(s): Kin 2918Q/R/S/T, Kin 3918Q/R/S/T.

Prerequisite(s): Completion of first year of the Kinesiology program and registration in the School of Kinesiology.

5 lecture/laboratory hours, 0.5 course.

Kinesiology 2989A/B – Martial Arts

This course is intended to provide an introduction and overview of martial arts and how it can be applied to Kinesiology. Students will learn fundamental techniques and skills of selected martial arts. Application of Kinesiology perspectives to martial arts including psychology, philosophy, history, sport management, biomechanics and exercise physiology.

Antirequisite(s): Kin 2909Q/R/S/T, Kin 2919Q/R/S/T.

Prerequisite(s): Completion of first year of the Kinesiology program and registration in the School of Kinesiology.

5 lecture/laboratory hours, 0.5 course.

Kinesiology 4495 – Field Experience in Strength and Conditioning

This course is a field experience where students are assigned to a varsity sport team as a student training assistant. Supplementary training will include various aspects related to sport performance training with a focus on strength and conditioning.

Prerequisite(s): Kin 2236A/B; Kin 2961A/B; Kin 3337A/B; Kin 3339A/B; current certification in Emergency First Responder (EFR) training.

2 lecture/seminar hours per week plus a field experience practicum. 1.0 course Restricted to students in fourth year Honors Specialization in Kinesiology and subject to Faculty procedural guidelines and approval.

AFFILIATED UNIVERSITY COLLEGES**PSYCHOLOGY**

Effective **September 1, 2016**, the following course be revised.

Psychology 1000 – Introduction to Psychology

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Note: Psychology 1000, and Psychology 1000W/X, will not serve as a substitute for Psychology 1100E for entry into any psychology module at Huron, nor will it provide access to any senior psychology course at Huron that requires Psychology 1100E.

3 lecture hours, 1.0 course.

BRESICA UNIVERSITY COLLEGE**RELIGIOUS STUDIES**

Effective **September 1, 2016**, the following course be introduced.

Religious Studies 2233 – Life and Death in Renaissance and Reformation Europe

Cultural, social, economic, and political themes including the Protestant and Catholic Reformations; the rise of absolutism; the commercial revolution; heresy, witchcraft, and scepticism; plague and health problems; the origins of modern science; demographic trends; the Puritans; baroque art and music; Cromwell, Gustavus Adolphus, and the creation of the modern army.

Antirequisite(s): History 2103, 2403E

3 hours, 1.0 course.

Family Studies 3345A/B – Family Violence

Course description: No change.

Prerequisite(s): 1.0 units of Family Studies 2000-level courses, or enrolment in third or fourth year of the ~~Major in Law, Crime, and Deviance~~ **Major in Criminal Justice** or ~~Honors Specialization in Crime and Communities~~ **Honors Specialization in Community and Criminal Justice** modules, or permission of instructor.

KING'S UNIVERSITY COLLEGE

POLITICAL SCIENCE

*Effective **September 1, 2016**, the following courses be introduced at King's University College.*

Political Science 2255F/G – Women in Political Life

This course focuses on the participation and subordination of women in the processes of politics and examines ways of achieving greater equality for women in political life and society.

Antirequisite(s): Political Science 2270E

3 hours, 0.5 course

Political Science 3324F/G – Introduction to Research Methods in Political Science

This course introduces students to a range of methodological approaches to questions in political science. Students will become familiar with qualitative and quantitative data sources and ways of using each to address political issues.

Antirequisite(s): Health Sciences 2801A/B, Psychology 2800E, 2820E, 2830A/B, and Sociology 2206A/B.

Prerequisite(s): Enrolment in Honors Political Science, Honors Specialization in Political Science, Majors in Political Science.

2 lecture hours, 0.5 course
