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## FACULTY OF ARTS AND HUMANITIES

### **MODERN LANGUAGES AND LITERATURES**

**Effective March 1, 2009, Hindi 1030: Hindi for Beginners** be introduced as part of MLL's course offerings.

#### **1030 - Hindi for Beginners**

Introduction to oral and written Hindi for students with little or no previous knowledge of the language.  
4 hours, 1.0 course.

Those students with Grade 12U Hindi must consult the Department before registering for this course.

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## DON WRIGHT FACULTY OF MUSIC

**Effective September 1, 2009, Music 3762A/B, Music and Politics, will be introduced in the Don Wright Faculty of Music.**

#### **Music 3762A/B: Music and Politics**

The study of music in selected socio-political contexts.

Antirequisite(s): Music 3771A/B in Winter 2007 or Fall 2008

Prerequisite(s): Music 2710F/G or Music 2711F/G

3 hours, 0.5 course

**Effective September 1, 2009, Music 3780A/B: Directed Study in Music History or Popular Music, and Music 3782A/B: Directed Study in Music Administrative Studies, will be introduced in the Don Wright Faculty of Music.**

#### **Music 3780A/B: Directed Study in Music History or Popular Music**

Independent research project for senior students in the Bachelor of Music with Honors (Music History) program. Topic and methodology to be determined on an individual basis through consultation between the student and the supervising professor.

Prerequisite(s): Permission of the Department of Music Research and Composition

0.5 course

#### **Music 3782A/B: Directed Study in Music Administrative Studies**

Independent research project for senior students in the Bachelor of Arts (Specialization in Music Administrative Studies) program. Topic and methodology to be determined on an individual basis through consultation between the student and the supervising professor.

Prerequisite(s): Permission of the Department of Music Research and Composition

0.5 course

**Effective September 1, 2009, Music 4791A/B/Y: The Notations of Early Music, be introduced in the Don Wright Faculty of Music.**

#### **Music 4791A/B/Y: The Notations of Early Music**

The notation and editing of European music of the Middle Ages and Renaissance; principles and practical exercises.

Antirequisite(s): The former Music 4790

Prerequisite(s): Music 1711F/G

3 hours, 0.5 course

**Effective September 1, 2009, Music 3772A/B/Y, 3862A/B/Y, 3951A/B/Y, 3952A/B/Y: Special Topics will be introduced in the Don Wright Faculty of Music.**

**Music 3772A/B/Y: Special Topics**

A course on special topics in the history of music, to be arranged.

Prerequisite(s): Music 1710F/G and permission of the Department of Music Research and Composition.  
3 hours, 0.5 course.

**Music 3862A/B/Y: Special Topics**

Special topics in music education, to be arranged.

Prerequisite(s): Permission of the Department of Music Education.  
3 hours, 0.5 course.

**Music 3951A/B/Y: Special Topics**

Special topics in Music Performance Studies.

Prerequisite(s): Music 2920 or 2921.  
3 hours, 0.5 course.

**Music 3952A/B/Y: Special Topics**

Special topics in Music Performance Studies.

Prerequisite(s): Music 2920 or 2921.  
3 hours, 0.5 course.

**FACULTY OF HEALTH SCIENCES****KINESIOLOGY**

*Effective September 1, 2010, Kinesiology 4477A/B (Exercise, Nutrition & Wellness) be introduced in the School of Kinesiology with the course description outlined below.*

**Kinesiology 4477A/B: Exercise, Nutrition & Wellness**

An overview of the impact of nutrition and exercise on selected health and exercise performance measures. Via lecture and reading materials, students will come to appreciate how lifestyle decisions which are under their control can enhance their health and their performance.

Prerequisite(s): Kinesiology 3339A/B or Foods & Nutrition 3339A/B

Antirequisite(s): Kinesiology 4471B (001) 2008-09; Foods & Nutrition 4477A/B

3 lecture hours, 0.5 course

**FACULTY OF SOCIAL SCIENCE****ANTHROPOLOGY**

**Anthropology 2240E - 2242E: Special Topics in Anthropology**

Special topics of current interest in Anthropology. List of special topics available in the Anthropology Department.

Prerequisite(s): Any first year Arts and Humanities or Social Science 1.0 or 0.5 Essay course.

3 lecture hours, 1.0 course.

*Effective September 1, 2009, the Minor in Anthropology module will allow students to take courses at the "2000 level or above" rather than the current "2200 level or above".*

**MINOR IN ANTHROPOLOGY**

Admission Requirements - no change

## Module

5.0 courses:

**GEOGRAPHY**

*Effective September 1, 2009 the calendar entry for Geography 2420A/B be revised to include modifications to the course description, addition of new prerequisites, and removal of incorrect prerequisites that occur in the current calendar. (Calendar Copy is on page 273 of UWO 2009 Calendar)*

**Geography 2420A/B – Economic Geography**

The forces reshaping global economic geography; fundamentals of spatial economics; principles of locational decisions; spatial interaction; and growth of spatial economic systems are examined. Examples of these concepts are taken from a variety of countries.

Prerequisite(s): 1.0 course from Geography 1100, 1300A/B, 1400F/G, 1500F/G or the former Geography 020E; Economics 1020, 1021A/B, 1022A/B; or MOS 1020A/B.

3 lecture hours, 0.5 course.

*Effective September 1, 2009 the calendar entry for Geography 3441F/G be revised to include modifications to the course description to read as shown below. (Calendar Copy is on page 274 of UWO 2009 Calendar)*

**Geography 3441F/G – Conservation and Development**

Examines struggles between conservation and economic development in a North-South context, setting the transformation of natural ecosystems and impoverishment of biodiversity in a political economic context that includes disparities in wealth, consumption, and 'ecological footprints'.

Prerequisite(s) Third or fourth year status at the University. Two full courses in Geography or equivalent, or enrolment in the Minor in Environment and Culture.

2 lecture hours, 1 tutorial hour, 0.5 course.

*Effective September 1, 2009 Geography 3465F/G be introduced by the Faculty of Social Science.*

**Geography 3465F/G: Urban Economic Development**

Critical analysis of recent economic development strategies and impacts on communities, cities and regions. Topics include: planning processes and techniques of economic development; technology and economic development strategy; and economic development clustering, networks and linkages.

Prerequisite(s): Third or Fourth year status and 0.5 course from Geography 1400F/G, 2210A/B, 2220A/B, 2420A/B or 2460F/G.

2 lecture hours, 1 tutorial hour, 0.5 course.

*Effective September 1, 2009 Geography 4220A/B: The GeoWeb and Geomedia be introduced by the Faculty of Social Science.*

**Geography 4220A/B: The GeoWeb and Geomedia**

This course explores the challenges and opportunities of citizens' production, access, dissemination and use of Internet-based geospatial data (the geoweb) including locational and still/video imagery. Explores issues of ethics, privacy, research design and citizen engagement via the geoweb.

Prerequisite(s): Fourth year status and Geography 2220A/B, or permission of instructor.

2 lecture hours, 1 laboratory hour, 0.5 course.

**MANAGEMENT AND ORGANIZATIONAL STUDIES**

*Effective September 1 2009, MOS 2199Y, 3199Y and 4199Y be introduced into the Commercial Aviation Management program, Bachelor of Management and Organizational Studies Program in the Faculty of Social Science.*

**MOS 2199Y Professional Pilot Academic Internship 1**

In this academic internship, students explore the principles of aviation, including air law, navigation, radio aids, meteorology, and general knowledge about aeronautics. This “ground school” takes place at the flight training centre and is a co-requisite to their flight training toward the private pilot’s license.

Prerequisite(s): Restricted to students registered in second year of the flight portion of the Commercial Aviation Management program.

3 lecture hours, 0.5 course

**MOS 3199Y Professional Pilot Academic Internship 2**

In this academic internship, students explore the principles of aviation, including air law, navigation, radio aids, meteorology, and general knowledge about aeronautics. This “ground school” takes place at the flight training centre and is a co-requisite to their flight training toward the commercial pilot’s license.

Prerequisite(s): MOS 2199Y and registration in third year of the flight portion of the Commercial Aviation Management program.

3 lecture hours, 0.5 course

**MOS 4199Y Professional Pilot Academic Internship 3**

In this academic internship, students explore the principles of aviation, including air law, instrumentation, navigation, radio aids, meteorology, and general knowledge about aeronautics. This “ground school” takes place at the flight training centre and is a co-requisite to their flight training toward their instrument rating.

Prerequisite(s): MOS 3199Y and registration in fourth year of the flight portion of the Commercial Aviation Management program.

3 lecture hours, 0.5 course

**Effective September 1, 2009** MOS 3321F/G (*Consumer Behavior*) be introduced as a course offering in the Bachelor of Management and Organizational Studies Program in the Faculty of Social Science.

**3321F/G Consumer Behavior**

This course focuses on understanding and predicting consumer behavior by integrating theories from psychology, sociology, anthropology and economics. Emphasis will be on how behavior is shaped by internal and external influences.

Prerequisite(s): MOS 3320A/B and enrollment in 3<sup>rd</sup> or 4<sup>th</sup> year of BMOS.

3 lecture hours, 0.5 course

**Effective September 1, 2009** MOS 4409F/G (*Aviation Safety*) be introduced as a course offering in the Bachelor of Management and Organizational Studies Program in the Faculty of Social Science.

**4409F/G Aviation Safety**

This course focuses on the science of pilot performance, aviation safety, risk management and aviation security. Information will be drawn from human physiology, basic learning theory, accident statistics, security threats, and pilot training. A focal point will be on understanding the nature and causation of accidents.

Antirequisite(s): MOS 3397A/B prior to September 2009.

Prerequisite(s): MOS 1022F/G and enrollment in 3<sup>rd</sup> or 4<sup>th</sup> year of BMOS.

3 lecture hours, 0.5 course.

#### **Effective September 1, 2009,**

a) English 2235A/B will be removed as a required course in the Minor in English module at Huron University College, and

b) the Minor in English will be corrected to remove the statement which currently reads: "3.0 courses in English at the 1000 level or above, at least 1.5 of which must be at the 2000 level or above." and replace it with: "3.5 courses in English at the 2000 level or above, at least 2.0 of which must be at the 2200-level or above."

A textual analysis and discussion of John Paul II's pre-pontifical and pontifical writings as they pertain to his philosophical thought.

A survey of the great philosophers from the pre-Socratics to Aquinas; focusing on the systematic unity of their thought, the influence of their ideas and their importance for us today. Themes include: the nature of reality, human existence, truth, God, political agency, and ethics.  
Antirequisite(s): Philosophy 2200F/G, 2201F/G
