Open to all students in the University, the Minor in Creative Writing offers undergraduate students the opportunity to develop their ability to write fiction, poetry, screenplays, and other forms of imaginative literature. Any undergraduate student may apply for admission, subject to prerequisites and general University entrance requirements.

Education 5440Q/S - Supporting Early Literacy in Kindergarten Classrooms

Designed to support core language arts instruction, this course focuses on classroom-based pedagogies that support the early literacy practices of children in kindergartens. Topics include a critical consideration of approaches to early literacy curricula in the context of the Ontario kindergarten program. 2 hr/wk/.25 credit.

LINGUISTICS

Effective **September 1, 2011**, the following course will be revised:

Linguistics 1028A/B - Linguistics: Applications and Extensions

Acquaints students with human language and how it relates to society and to the mind. Topics include applications of linguistics, such as language acquisition, language and law, language disorders, and language variation across time, space and society.

Prerequisite(s): One of Anthropology 1027A/B, Linguistics 2288A/B, both French 2805A/B and 2806A/B, Spanish 3303A/B, the former French 2800 or permission of Linguistics program. 3 lecture hours, 0.5 course.
